THE HOLIDAY SEASON IS PRIME TIME FOR CAR PROWLERS AND THIEVES. GIFTS AND VALUABLES LEFT IN VEHICLES CAN MAKE THEIR JOB EASY.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS TO HELP REDUCE YOUR RISK:

- When you exit or enter your parked vehicle, stop and take a look around the area
- Before leaving your parked car, always lock the doors
- Park in a well-lit area, use parking lots frequented by others
- Put all valuables and gifts in your trunk. If that's not possible, conceal gifts and other valuables
- Try not to unload gifts in your vehicle and then leave it unattended in the same parking spot. Car prowlers might be on the lookout for shoppers traveling back and forth from stores to unload gifts.
- Never leave your car running unattended



Community Transportation update Your Official Newsletter

Tuscany LRT Station Parking Restrictions

I would like to take this opportunity to inform community members of the following updates in our community:

Transportation

- A request was made to the city for a wheel chair ramp on the west side of Royal Oak Way next to the playground (refer to Figure 1). The city is expected to include this in the 2016 budget.
- A request was made to the city for a cyclist warning sign at the intersection of Country Hills Blvd. and Royal Birch Blvd., as the wall blocks the sight of both bikers and drivers (refer to Figure 2). The city is still reviewing the request.
- A request was made to the city to install a "No U-turn" sign at the intersection of Royal Birch Blvd. and Royal Oak Way. This is to prevent motorists from driving into the community to make U-turns to beat the lights on Country Hills Blvd. and 112 Ave.
- Funding has been approved to upgrade 112 Ave. and the Sarcee Trail, Stoney Trail intersection. Once completed, gravel trucks will be routed away from the intersection of Country Hills Blvd. and 112 Ave.
- A request was made to the city to extend the Play Ground Zone on Royal Birkdale Blvd. westward to include the Royal Birkdale Crescent intersection. The city is still reviewing the request.

Tuscany LRT Station Parking Restrictions After reviewing parking habits around the LRT station for a year, and input from residents living close by, additional parking restrictions have recently been introduced by the city (refer to Figure 3) for the following reasons:

• Restricted 3 hour parking (Blue lines) introduced on Eamon Rd. Double parking narrows the street to a one lane road, which prevents movement of Calgary transit busses and other motorist. The problem is even worse in the winter when snow piles are deposited on both sides of the street.

- No parking zones (Red lines). This is to prevent cars from parking too close to intersections and blocking the view of motorist driving into the intersection. The west end of Eamon Road is very narrow and parking along this stretch of road forces drivers to go off the road.
- Parked cars blocking residential entrances.
- Signage at green circle is been reviewed by the city to make the intersection safer.

 - Consider hanging on to your extra recyclables for next week's collection when you have more space in your cart.
 - Bring them to a nearby community recycling depot.
 Keep in mind that our depots fill up quickly during the
 holiday season, so it's best to take note of a couple
 locations in case one is full. Find a list of locations
 online at calgary.ca/recycledepot.





RRROCA will not be pre-screening, sanctioning, or verifying any credentials for those babysitters using this service. As the parent/employer, you take on full responsibility for interviewing, screening and hiring the babysitters for your child.

For Teens Seeking Babysitting Work

We have plenty of demand for qualified babysitters so please get in touch! First, your family will need to have an active RRROCA membership. Secondly, all babysitters on the registry are required to have a valid babysitter training certificate, regardless of age. Once you have these:
