I can feel it. Can you feel it? It's coming. Spring!






COFFEE WITH THE COUNCILLOR - TWO-YEAR REPORT CARD PRESENTATION FEEDBACK

Ukrainian Easter Bread (Babka)

Looking to get some use out of that bread maker? Well, this recipe is the perfect excuse. Babka is a light, buttery, slightly sweet, delicate cake-like bread (with or without raisins), baked in coffee tins and traditionally served at Easter.

This recipe is every bit as delicious as the

handmade version, but without all the work! If you have never made a traditional Easter bread (or any bread, for that matter), let this one be your first!

Ingredients (Gluten Free Option: Replace all-purpose flour with 3 and 2/3 cups rice flour):

I egg

. ----

3 egg yolks

4 tblsp melted butter

3 tblsp sugar

3 tblsp powdered milk

½ tsp salt

2 tblsp undiluted frozen

orange juice

I tblsp grated orange zest

I tsp vanilla

I cup water

3 ³/₄ cup all-purpose flour

I tsp bread maker yeast

I cup raisins (washed)

3 egg whites (beaten)

5 (1lb/500g) coffee tins

1/4 cup shortening

Replace all-purpose flour with 3 and 2/3 cups rice flour

- I. In a small bowl, beat egg, egg yolks, butter, sugar, salt, milk powder, orange juice, orange zest, and vanilla. Pour into the bread maker. Add water.
- 2. Add flour, then form a small crater with your finger in the top of the flour and pour yeast into this crater.
- 3. Set bread machine on dough cycle and when 'add fruit/ingredients' signal goes off, add raisins.
- 4. When dough cycle is complete, remove from bread machine.
- 5. Prepare coffee tins by greasing generously with shortening and divide dough into 5 balls. Place balls into tins and let rise until double in bulk.
- 6. Beat egg whites until foamy and brush tops of loaves.
- 7 .Bake on low rack of oven on 375 degrees F for 20 25 minutes or until golden brown on top (if loaves are browning too fast, cover with aluminum foil)
- 8. Check for doneness: Remove from oven and knock on the bottom of the tin with your knuckles. If done, it will sound hollow when tapped (yes, this really works!)
- 9. Remove loaves from oven, cool slightly and remove from tins onto pillows covered with tea towels.



- Cool and turn loaves several times to prevent them from flattening.
- *Loaves are very soft and require careful handling.
- II. Slice in rounds and serve with butter, if desired.



Do you know a senior who may be at risk for fraud? Several factors make seniors more vulnerable to fraud:

- Loneliness makes a senior more willing to talk with a friendly stranger.
- A desire to be helpful or charitable opens the door to those who wish to fraudulently tug at the heart strings.
- A generation with more trust of others provides opportunity to abuse that trust.
- Some seniors have lost a degree of physical or mental acuity making them even more vulnerable.

Each year, millions of seniors are victims of consumer fraud through notable schemes using common and everyday techniques. Senior citizens continue to be an important and rapidly increasing segment of our population and studies have shown that senior citizens are more at risk to be targeted by telemarketing scams than other age groups. Offers too good to be true usually are. To prevent fraud for seniors you know, below are some tips to share:

- Never give out your personal information over the phone or Internet unless you have initiated the contact. Legitimate business callers will never ask you for this information over the phone.
- Ask to receive the "unbelievable deal" or the "amazing prize offer" in writing so you review it before you agree.
- If a caller asks you to pay for an offer in advance or asks for your credit card number or Social Insurance number, tell the person you don't give out personal information over the telephone.
- Remember that legitimate telemarketers won't be turned off if you use these techniques. They will appreciate dealing with an educated consumer.

Winter, All Weather or All Season Tires

What makes them different?

I. **Material:** Tires are made of natural and synthetic rubber, silica, metal and a host of other materials. Winter tires contain a higher percentage of natural rubber and silica which help keep the tires soft in freezing temperatures. Think of a gecko's soft feet gripping on to smooth glass. All Season tires (sometimes called summer tires) contain a higher percentage of synthetic rubber, so they tend to harden in freezing temperature resulting in reduced breaking power and steering control. Note, temperature, NOT SNOW is the limiting factor.

2. **Thread Profile:** Winter tires have more complex aggressive thread patterns which help grip on to snow, and prevent snow build up on the tire. Snow or ice is compressed as a tire moves over it causing it to melt slightly (like

when skating). The groves help channel out the water from under the tire preventing hydroplaning and improving grip.

Below 5-7degC winter tires outperform all season tires even when there is no snow on the road. In summer all season tires outperform and do not wear as fast as winter tires. All weather tires can be thought of as a hybrid between the two.

Tire Markings:



• M+S: (Mud & Snow) compared to a "normal" tires, these tires provide improved driving in snow and ice. Winter, all weather and all season (summer) tires carry this marking



• The 3 peaked mountain: The snow/freezing weather performance of the tire have been validated by standardized lab test. Winter and all weather tires carry this marking. There are no markings that differentiate between winter and all weather tires; you just have to rely on the sales person.

Noteworthy points:

- Different tire types have different breaking and steering control capacities, so mixing them is a bad idea.
- 4 wheel drives have superior acceleration on slippery roads compared to 2 wheel drives. However steering control and breaking power for both vehicles are limited by the tire type.
- Quebec mandated winter tires on all vehicles between Dec 15 & Mar. 15, resulting in a 17% drop in winter collisions, and 36% drop in related serious injuries or death.

With dozens of models with overlapping characteristics, and varying driving conditions (plowed, unplowed, high gradient, city or back country roads) so you need a personalized solution. Two common choices are: install all weather tires year round, or install winter tires in winter and all season tires the rest of the year.

What to Know Before You Go...River Cruises

Getting off and on is simple.

Embarkation and debarkation are quite easy, and you won't need to build-in extra time to accommodate the process. There's no waiting in a long line or security station — you simply check in like a hotel, and go to your stateroom

Town centers are typically steps away.

For the most part, you spend your days in port and sail at night. You'll also generally step off your ship in the center of town, so there's no need for taxis or shuttles.

River cruises are very inclusive.

There are variations from line to line and extra paid premium experiences on some ships, but in general, your shore excursions are included in the cruise fare; Wi-Fi access is free (although not constantly available); drinks at lunch and dinner carry no charge; and there may be special complimentary events on land as well.

The pace is relaxed in comparison to ocean cruises.

River vessels travel slowly enough that you can sometimes

borrow one of the onboard bicycles and arrive at the next port before the ship does, should you feel so inclined. The staff will give you a local number to call (in case you get lost), as well as the locations of good pubs and bistros.

River cruise culture is very friendly.


Passengers, traveling solo or otherwise, circulate and chat easily, make friends quickly and join one another at meals, lectures and entertainment.

You sail close to the shore.

You can actually hear conversations in the woods and fields along the river, smell the newly mown grass and wave to people on the shore.

You have your options when it comes to meals.

There are multiple options for dining, but most guests eat in the dining room for the evening meal. Staff members will give advice on dining in the ports of call; in some cases, the lines issue lunch money to encourage guests to try the local dishes on shore or arrange group dinners at special restaurants. If you have special dietary needs, let the cruise line know well ahead of time. Also, coffee, tea and tempting snacks are available all the time, without charge.


