Hello Ward 2!

his spring, Transportation Network Companies (TNCs) like Uber will be able to legally operate in The City of Calgary. Like most Calgarians, I believe in free enterprise, which is why I supported the creation of a new bylaw to provide more choice and competition amongst TNCs. The new bylaw will allow TNCs to operate in a fair and competitive market. They address citizen, driver and passenger safety and ensure greater competition and customer service. The bylaw proposes common sense requirements for TNCs' including:

- An annual operating license from The City of Calgary
- Valid Class 4 driver's license
- Annual Calgary Police Service (CPS) background check

• Proof of valid commercial insurance as required by the Government of Alberta

• Proof of eligibility to work in Canada

• Proof of provincially-approved 134-point mechanical inspection, conducted annually or every 50,000 km whatever comes first

While it is important that we have more choice and competition amongst TNCs, it is also important that the new bylaw provides adequate safety and security for both drivers and passengers of TNCs. I believe that this new bylaw will achieve this balance and provide all Calgarians with more choice, and allow TNC's to operate in a fair and competitive market.

Pedestrian safety is another important issue that we have been taking action on. This spring, new crosswalks have been installed and current crosswalks have been enhanced at numerous locations in Ward 2. This includes an enhanced crosswalk at Rocky Ridge Road & Royal Oak Way, a new pedestrian corridor on Crowfoot Way in Crowfoot Centre, and more will be coming throughout this spring and summer.

Over 100 people attended the open house on the Sarcee Trail Interchange at Stoney Trail to provide their feedback on the proposed improvements. These improvements will make the interchange safer and also help reduce travel times for the movement of goods and for commuters traveling southbound on





Sarcee Trail to eastbound Stoney Trail. Construction is anticipated to begin in early May. Please check out my website at www. joemagliocca.com for updates on this project.

Creamy Carrot Chowder

"Soup puts the heart at ease, calms down the violence of hunger, eliminates the tension of the day, and awakens and refines the appetite,"

I love this soup because it's hearty, healthy, tasty and kids like it too! I don't know about you, but if I'm going to have soup as a meal, I want it to have some protein in it.

If you are not a beef eater or simply want to lighten it up, you could substitute ground turkey or chicken for the ground beef. And it can easily become a vegetarian dish by using vegetable stock and eliminating the meat all together.

Serve with artisan bread and olive oil with balsamic vinegar and you have yourself a cozy, filling meal on a cool spring evening.

I make big batches of this soup (double or triple the recipe) and freeze it. It freezes well for up to six months.

INGREDIENTS:

- I lb. extra lean or lean ground beef
- 1/2 c chopped celery
- 1/2 c chopped onion
- I c chopped green pepper
- 3 c grated carrots
- I can tomato juice (32 oz.)
- I can condensed cream of celery soup, undiluted (10 oz.)
- I can condensed cream of mushroom soup, undiluted (10 oz.)
- 6 c beef or vegetable soup stock
- I tsp minced garlic
- I tsp dried marjoram

DIRECTIONS:

I. In a large, non-stick pan, brown the ground beef.

2. Combine the remaining ingredients in large soup pot and cook on medium heat.

3. Add the browned ground beef to the soup mixture and mix thoroughly.

4. Bring the soup to a boil, then reduce and simmer and cook uncovered for 1 hour or until vegetables are tender.

Community Economic Resiliency Fund Report

As a Calgary Economic Development Board Director, I am pleased to announce the unanimous passing of an initiative for a one-time operating budget increase of seven million dollars that I spearheaded to Council. This enterprise is a coordinated response to Calgary's current economic conditions, and will act to align and increase the pace of implementation of the 10-Year Economic Strategy for Calgary. The labour market initiatives include a head office real estate action plan and an accelerated economic diversification in logistics, film and creative industries, agribusiness and renewable energy. In addition, they represent a roadmap for innovation as we move ahead.

Crowchild Trail and 24 Avenue N.W. - Intersection Improvements

The increase in commuter traffic at the intersection of Crowchild Trail and 24 Avenue N.W. has resulted in severe back-ups, leading The City to seek ways to reduce the amount of congestion in this area.

After careful evaluation, The City implemented a restriction of the left-hand, northbound turn from Crowchild Trail to 24 Avenue N.W. during the morning rush hours (6:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.) on weekdays after seeing positive results from a trial that ended in late 2014. Restricting the left-hand turn allowed for a longer green signal time for the heaviest amount of traffic headed southbound on Crowchild Trail N.W. and greatly improved traffic flow.

The City is also implementing the following upgrades:

• To provide additional capacity for left turns and to reduce lengthy delays and long queues dual left turn lanes from eastbound 24 Avenue N.W. onto northbound Crowchild Trail.

• Construction of "smart" right turn lanes from Crowchild Trail to 24 Avenue N.W. will help reduce vehicle speeds and provide motorists with a better view of the traffic stream they are about to enter. This will also provide motorists with better visibility of pedestrians crossing the right turn channel, making the intersection safer for pedestrians.

• 24 Street N.W. intersects with 24 Avenue N.W. just east of Crowchild Trail. To improve operations at this junction, a traffic island was constructed at the intersection of 24 Street N.W. and 24 Avenue N.W. to restrict access to southbound Crowchild Trail.

ead injuries are a leading cause of serious injury and death to children riding bicycles^{*}. Most injuries occur when a cyclist suffers a fall, strikes a stationary object, or collides with another cyclist/pedestrian. Remember – it's the law in Alberta that cyclists under the age of 18 must wear a helmet. Helmets should be CSA approved and worn during recreational activities such as skateboarding, in-line skating, or cycling.

GETTING INFORMED

• Wearing a helmet while cycling can prevent a serious injury, or even save a life;

- Brain injuries can cause permanent disability or death;
- Reduce your risk by always wearing your helmet;
- Replace any helmet that has been involved in a crash

GETTING STARTED

- Allow children to assist when buying their helmet. Cyclists who choose their own helmet are more likely to wear them;
- Start the habit early. Young children learning to ride tricycles need to wear helmets;
- Parents must lead by example wear a helmet when cycling.

GETTING THE RIGHT FIT

- Take the time to properly fit and adjust your helmet to ensure maximum protection in case of a crash;
- When worn properly, helmets should fit level, not tilted up, or down over the forehead;
- Helmets should feel snug, but not too tight. To test the fit, the helmet should not fall off when you shake your head from side-to-side while the straps are unfastened;

• Adjust the chin straps to form a "Y" below and slightly forward from the ears;

- Only one finger should be able to fit under the chin strap when it is fastened;
- Do not forget to use the sizing pads included with the helmet. They will help improve the overall fit, comfort and safety.

Here are five facts you may not know about doggy doo-doo:

- 1. It's classified as a hazardous pollutant. It's in the same category as toxic chemicals!
- It's crawling with E. coli and roundworm larvae which, if ingested by humans or dogs, can lead to brain, eye and other organ damage.
- It's not a good fertilizer. Its high nutrient content is toxic to lawns and will create "hot spots" causing the grass to burn and discolour.
- 4. It doesn't absorb into the soil, so the risk of spreading its harmful effects can linger for years!
- 5. It attracts mice, coyotes and other wildlife that consider it a delicious snack.

Keeping our city pet-waste free is easy, if we all do our part. Always carry pet waste bags with you when you walk your dog, and pick up and properly dispose of your pet's waste as soon as possible.





• Hire someone to help you pack and move to ease some stress.


• Pack an "open me first" box with essentials such as bed linens, and other important items such as toiletries, change of clothing, medications, etc.

the park, to increase security. With health and safety paramount, areas of the lake will be fenced off to prevent accidents. ■ CROSSWALK SAFETY: ENGINEERING, EDUCATION AND ENFORCEMENT

Parents in Rocky Ridge were shaken last December by the distressing news that two young girls had been hit by a vehicle while they were on a crosswalk on Rocky Ridge Boulevard. Yet despite this tragic accident, some motorists are still driving over the speed limit along the Boulevard and far too often they are failing to stop for pedestrians at crosswalks, says the injured girls' mother.

"I have contacted the City of Calgary to request a three way stop be put in at the corner of Rocky Ridge Boulevard and Rocky Ridge Close", she says. "This solution will help alleviate both issues - pedestrians trying to cross the road... and, more importantly, it will force drivers to slow down." Transport experts at the City of Calgary, however, disagree, saying a stop sign won't necessarily improve safety.

Both City Transport officials and police emphasise that while engineering and enforcement are key factors in pedestrian safety, education is paramount. Drivers should expect crosswalks at every intersection and be alert and slow their speed accordingly. Pedestrians need to be aware of oncoming vehicles. "Make eye contact with the driver, keep watching for other vehicles and be sure they are slowing down before you step forward", recommends Staff Sgt. Paul Stacey, "Never stop watching and be ready to react!"

A spokesperson for the City says there are four factors that determine whether a three-way stop may be a solution: the volume of traffic at both the major and minor roadways at the intersection, the split between them, the length of the delay in emerging from the minor road and the number of collisions over a five-year period. It is a measure aimed at improving traffic flow measure rather than pedestrian safety. Evidence shows that advance pedestrian warning signs are more effective in preventing collisions between vehicles and pedestrians. Everyone needs to learn safer habits.

"Driver behaviour is a city-wide concern at intersections", says Staff Sgt. Stacey. "We encourage anyone who has concerns about road safety in a particular area to notify the CPS, preferably through the traffic service link on the front page of our website, and we will respond to conduct enforcement operations in the area as necessary." Concerned road users are also encouraged to send photographic or video evidence to the CPS.


Meanwhile on the engineering side, the City confirms that a work-order has been issued to install advance pedestrian warning signs, with yellow reflective post covers, at the intersection where the girls were injured.
