### Transportation Summary

- The red light camera installed on Country Hills Blvd & I 12 Avenue has greatly reduced the gravel truck nuisance. Once construction on the Sarcee – Stony Trail Interchange and I 12 Avenue are completed, the trucks will be routed away from the community.
- Two merge traffic signs were installed at the intersection of Country Hills Blvd. and Royal Birch Blvd. This reminds drivers

making a right turn from Royal Birch Blvd. to Country Hills that they have a dedicated lane, and so do not need to stop at the intersection.

- Traffic at the intersection of Royal Birch Blvd. & Royal Oak Way (the 4 way stop sign) continues to be a problem; unfortunately, there is no obvious solution. There is not enough space for a traffic circle or to have a double right turn off Royal Oak Way.
- We turned down a request to support the removal of the bus trap between Royal Lake Drive and Royal Vale Drive. We believe it will result in increased traffic from residents cutting though; separation of Rocky Vale Green and Rockcliff Landing communities; and significant change in the character of Rock Lake, Rockcliff, & Rockford communities.
- We asked the City to install pedestrian crossing signs with reflective poles at the intersection of Rocky Ridge Cl. & Rocky Ridge Blvd. after a pedestrian collision.
- The new playground zone on Royal Oak Way is about 500m long; to prevent drivers speeding up before getting to the end we have requested additional playground zone signs for the stretch.
- The City turned down our request to construct a missing wheelchair ramp at the playground at Royal Oak Drive for safety and signage reasons. The ramp will be located at the bottom of a curved slope with trees blocking driver's line of sight.
- Timing and speed limit of "I-slow" Lights in the playground zone on Royal Oak Drive do not correlate with the playground zone time and road speed limit. The City has been asked to correct this.
- Stop signs are primarily for vehicular control and not for pedestrian safety. For this reason we did not support request from residents to install them for pedestrian safety reasons.

#### On a final note, remember:

- Pedestrians have the right of way at every intersection in our community, even if there is no marked crosswalk. Failure to yield has a \$776 fine.
- If you have a traffic concern, first call the city at 311 to report it, and make sure to send me the reference number. If you need advice or a second opinion before contacting 311, feel free to contact me.

Ridge Royal Oak Community website (RRROCA.org), under Sports.

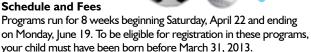
Register early to avoid disappointment. If you have not registered for any programs with RRROCA in 2015 and/or 2016, you will need to set up a new account.

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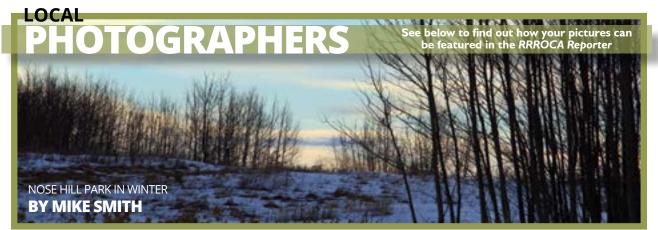
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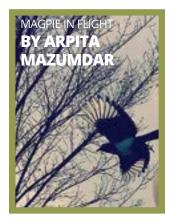

Have you ever wanted to continue learning but feel you are too old to go back to school? Does having your mind stimulated through a University quality course without the homework and tests excite you? If it does, then we have an opportunity to get you out of the house and beat those winter blues!

Finally we will have a look at the huge and growing array of things that are proposed as having anti-cognitive aging powers, from crossword puzzles to computer games supposedly designed by Neuroscientists to keep us mentally nimble and we will talk a bit about what psychological research is telling us about those things, that they can be helpful but they are not the astonishing breakthroughs they are usually marketed as.

These classes will be taught by Professor Mike Boyes, PhD. Mike has just retired after teaching Psychology at the University of Calgary for the past 30 years. He also serves as an expert on Developmental and Psychological issues for local and national media, the Discovery Channel, and the Provincial Crown Prosecutor's Office (Alberta Provincial and Queens Bench Courts).

### Two Cheese Tuna Mexi-Melts By Terri Gilson, Rocky Ridge Resident & Volunteer Contributor



inter is the ideal time for indulging in comfort food, and this Tuna Melt is the ultimate in healthy comfort food. You don't even have to be a big fan of canned tuna to love this recipe. It's also kid tested and approved! This new take on an old favourite pairs Mexican flavours with healthy broccoli slaw, two types of gooey

melted cheese, and good ol' canned tuna for an easy, healthy, and quick weeknight dinner.

Canned tuna is an excellent meal option for both price and convenience!

#### Ingredients:

- I/2 (340g/I2oz) bag broccoli coleslaw
- 1/2 cup sharp/old cheddar cheese (light or regular)
- I/2 cup Monterey Jack cheese
- I(170 g) can tuna
- I/4 cup mayonnaise
- I/2 tsp crushed or pureed garlic
- I/2 tsp agave syrup
- I/2 tsp salt
- 2 Tbsp. fresh lime juice (can substitute concentrated)
- I Tbsp. fresh cilantro, finely chopped
- I Tbsp. jalapenos, chopped (I use tamed jalapenos)
- 3 taco shells, crushed
- 1/3 cup canned sliced black olives
- I/4 cup chopped green onion
- 4 Tbsp. salsa
- 4 pieces of rye bread

Garnish: additional salsa and sour cream

#### Directions:

- I. Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray 9x13 cookie sheet with non-stick cooking spray
- 2. In a small bowl, mix garlic, lime juice, mayo and agave together with a whisk.
- 3. Mix tuna, broccoli slaw, green onion, jalapenos, cilantro, black olives and salt together in a large, separate bowl.
- 4. Pour mayonnaise mixture over broccoli coleslaw/tuna mixture and mix well.
- 5. Toast bread (to prevent sogginess).
- 6. Top toast with about 1/3 1/2 cup broccoli/tuna mixture (however much you can fit).



- 7. Soften taco shells in microwave for 20 seconds, then crush. Spread crushed shells over tuna melts, dividing shells between all 4 melts.
- 8. Spread I Tbsp. of salsa on each melt over crushed taco shells.
- 9. Top with both cheeses, dividing between all 4 melts.
- 10. Melt in oven for 8 minutes, then turn up to broil for about 2 minutes or until cheese is bubbly and starting to brown.
- 11. Top with additional salsa and sour cream as garnish, if desired.

### Hello Ward 1!

y office has received inquiries from seniors struggling with household cleaning and snow shoveling. I would like to inform residents about Fair Entry; these are programs and services for low income Calgarians. Fair Entry is an application process for City-subsidized programs and services. This process will assess your income eligibility for five City programs with one application.

The City funds a program called Seniors Services Home Maintenance (SSHM). SSHM helps low income seniors live safely and securely in their own homes. The program provides these clients with basic yard care, snow removal, house cleaning, interior & exterior painting and minor repairs.

#### Who is eligible?

Seniors (65+) who:

- Are unable to do basic house or yard work
- Do not own other property
- Have no one else living in the home who could perform basic housecleaning, yard work or snow shovelling
- Are without family, community or other home maintenance service supports
- Meet one of Fair Entry's eight ways to qualify for this and several other City subsidized programs and services. Find out if you qualify and apply online at Fair Entry (see link below).

Older adults who meet the eligibility criteria are placed on a wait list for service. An assessment of need based on the considerations noted below, determines priority for service as high, moderate or low. In most cases, those with high and moderate levels of need will be served first, and those with low levels of need are referred to other support services, where available. To meet operational needs, service may be provided based on proximity to current clients or geographic zone availability, regardless of priority rating.

### It's February already!

t the start of 2017, all Calgary City Councillors took a 2.49% wage rollback. I am very supportive of this decision as I believe that the City needs to be responsible with spending so that we can prevent taxes and fees from increasing.

The City's snow removal crews have been busy this winter ensuring our roads are in a safe and reasonable winter driving condition. One method that they use on residential streets is "flat-blading," which flattens the snow to a hard pack so that it's easier to drive on. One result of flat-blading is the build-up of snow along the side of a roadway, also known as windrow.

Plow operators make every attempt to keep driveways clear, or keep windrows as small as possible, but any snow buildup on driveways that does occur is the responsibility of the adjacent property owner to remove, much like sidewalk shovelling.
