How to Figure out Which Plastics are Recyclable

Do you stare at your empty plastics wondering if it belongs in the blue cart? Ask yourself this question to be sure you recycle your plastics right.

Is it a container? If your plastic is a container like a bottle, jug, or tub, it can be recycled. Make sure it's empty, clean and dry. If it's not a container, it is not accepted in the blue cart. There may be other disposal options for your item – check calgary.ca/whatgoeswhere.

Be aware of these exceptions:

- Bundle your clean, stretchy plastic wrap, bubble wrap and other plastic film into a single plastic bag and tie closed for the blue cart.
- Foam packaging (polystyrene, EPE, EPS, Styrofoam) including foam marked with the recycle symbol belongs in your black cart as garbage.
- Recycle plastic lids larger than the size of your palm in the blue cart. If it's smaller, it goes in the black cart.



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Back to School Basics

Welcome back families to the 2021 – 2022 school year. The last couple years have been anything but normal for our kid's education.

During Covid our household routines went out the window as many others. This was something no one had dealt with before and we all dealt with it the best we could. The stop and go of classes from going in person, to home schooling to back to their classrooms seemed never ending. Some children seemed to breeze through it and it didn't bother them at all. Others though struggled with the changing environment, not having a constant schedule and routine.

Now that we are entering into the 2021-2022 school year with hopes the disruptions will subside, we need to help our kids get back into the regular routines of school. Here are some tips to help make this adjustment a little easier. This is the perfect time to check in with our kids and keep that communication open. How are they feeling about returning to school? Is it their normal back to school anxiety or is it heightened due to the pandemic? Talk to them about their fears, offer reassurance and let them know you are there. *If you do believe that your child is having more than normal anxiety reach out to a professional for guidance, they can make a big difference in your child's life*

Re-establish bed time routines and set that alarm to get them in the habit of getting up for school. Get rid of those handhelds close to bed and grab a book. Let that mind settle so they can fall asleep at the time you set.

Get the kids helping pack their backpacks, laying out their clothes for the next day and making those lunches. It will help give them the confidence that they are in charge of their school day. Feeling in charge of your day instead of just going along with it, will make them feel stronger and more confident.

Lastly, we are still in the pandemic but with a light at the end of the tunnel thanks to the vaccinations. Keep reminding our kids to still stay safe. If masks are required, then they have them on hand. Keeping our hands clean. Not sharing drinks/food with our friends. And if you aren't feeling well then, we don't go to school that day as we care about our friends/teachers too and don't want them to get sick.

2021 Municipal Election

The 2021 municipal election is taking place this fall. Voters can cast their ballot during the advance vote (Oct. 4-10) or on election day (Oct. 18). If you are unable to vote during the advance vote or on election day because of a physical disability or absence from the city or working as an election worker, you can request a mail-in ballot online by visiting www.electionscalgary.ca.

Voter checklist:

- 1. Check your eligibility to vote.
- 2. Some ward boundaries are changing on election day. Look up which ward you will be in as of Oct. 18.
- 3. Find out who is running in your ward and what is on the ballot.
- 4. Make a vote plan look up your designated voting station for the advance vote and election day (available after Sept. 21) or watch the mail for your Voter Information Card to decide when and where to vote.
- 5. Make sure you have one of the several acceptable forms of ID with your name and current address on it.
- 6. Get out and VOTE!

Voting is an important responsibility for every Canadian. It's how we shape our communities and choose which leaders will represent us. Voting connects citizens with the political process and with each other. When you take part in an election and express your view, you make democracy work.

Back to Commuting: Online Map Shows Calgary's Roadway Activities.

With students back to school and workers returning to the office, road traffic and foot traffic is increasing. To help citizens with their commuting, The City of Calgary has a map that shows where roadway activities are occurring. Activities such as sidewalk repairs, local improvements, various street improvements and miscellaneous construction areas are shown on the map. The information in this map can help you plan your route and look for alternative routes, if needed. It is located at https://maps.calgary.ca/.

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Ensuring the Safety of People and Pets

Responsibilities of dog owners in off-leash areas:

• Dogs are allowed to be off-leash only in designated off-leash areas. Even in off-leash areas, dogs must be on leash in the parking lot and on the pathways. All of Calgary's pathways are on leash areas.



• In an off-leash area, owners must ensure that their dog is under control at all times. Under control means that the dog must remain at such a distance from his owner so as to respond to voice, sound or sight commands. It also means that the dog must not chase, threaten or attack people or animals.

Responsibilities of dog owners on pathways:

- Owners must have their dog secured by a leash no longer than two metres.
- Owners must ensure that their dog remains on the righthand side of the pathway unless moving around other users.
- Owners must ensure that their dog remains under control at all times and does not interfere with other users.
- Owners must not be on a bicycle, skateboard or rollerblades with any animal on a leash.

Responsibilities of dog owners in other public spaces:

- Owners must not leave their dog unattended while tethered or tied on premises accessible to the public. Responsibilities of dog owners on private properties:
- Owners must ensure that their dog is not left unsupervised while tethered or tied on a private property.
