With direction from the Events Chair, an Event Lead helps to execute specific events, from the planning stage to the wrap up.


Time commitment: Approximately 2-5 hours/month (not including event attendance)

Director Planning and Development

Dave has been a director of the Rocky Ridge Royal Oak Community association for almost 10 years. His history in Rocky Ridge started in 2002 when he and 5 other families purchased a 5 acre parcel to build their sustainable dream homes. After extensive engagement with neighbours it was agreed that they could develop and service 25 single family lots. The development would come to be called EchoHaven and the requirement for new homes was that they must be NetZero or nearly NetZero, high energy efficiency and zero greenhouse emissions. There is no natural gas therefore all homes had to produce their own energy.

At this time, EchoHaven is still arguably the most progressive sustainable development in Canada. Dave and family moved into their home in 2010.

Since Dave is a Landscape Architect, he offered to assist RRROCA using his professional experience in reviewing City permit applications and improving the community. As the Planning and Development Director he is responsible for reviewing all private and institutional development proposals with the objective of adding value to our community.

One of his goals in volunteering for RRROCA was to create a community park with outdoor hockey and leisure skating. He helped to raise funds and stick handle through all the processes and approvals to get it built.

Dave and his wife Debbie love the community and hope to be living here for a long time.

Councillor Report

Hello residents of Ward 1! While I write this update several weeks before you read it, I hope the weather is beginning to warm and we all have the chance to enjoy some of the amazing outdoor spaces in Ward 1. One of the parks in Ward 1, Baker Park, is home to the most popular disc golf course in Canada, and the fifth busiest in the world! If you haven't already, I encourage you to check it out.

Council is scheduled to receive an update from Administration on March 8 on whether there are partners interested in working with The City to build an Event Centre in Victoria Park. I believe this project is important for the economic and cultural health of our city. I'm optimistic that we'll find a path forward.

Decreased ridership, the Opioid Crisis and cold weather have raised some safety concerns on Calgary Transit. Both Calgary Transit and my office take this issue seriously, and we are continuing to address it. Some station buildings are now closed 24 hours a day, and additional officers have been deployed across the system. If you have a safety concern, you can discreetly text with a Transit dispatcher at 74100.

Speaking of Transit, the MyFare mobile app now supports seniors and low income transit passes. It's easy to use, and one less thing to remember!

The Ward 1 website is now up and running. You can find detailed updates on what's happening in Ward 1 by visiting sonyasharp.ca. As always, if you have any concerns, please don't hesitate to contact my office.

Change to Black Cart Service Provider in Your Community

Starting in April, GFL Environmental will provide black cart garbage collection to residents in most of the northwest quadrant and part of the southwest.

You will continue to use the same black cart and there is no change to your cart pickup schedule. GFL's green trucks will empty black carts in your community.

The City of Calgary will continue to pick up your blue and green carts. Your community is part of a pilot that follows Council's direction to contract out 25 per cent of residential black cart collection.

In Our **City**

Burns and Scalds

Emergency Medical Services routinely respond to emergencies involving young children who have sustained burns or scalds. These incidents often occur inside the child's own home. Common causes include a child accidentally tipping hot liquids onto themselves, touching hot surfaces (stove, iron), or making contact with electrical outlets. Fortunately, incidents such as these can be avoided by taking preventative measures.

Degrees of burn

- 1°: Affects only the top layers of the skin; appears red like a sun burn; discomfort is generally tolerable;
- 2°: Deeper and much more painful than 1°burns; broken skin or blisters commonly develop;
- 3°: Severe: the deepest layers of skin and tissue are injured; may appear charred or leathery.

First Aid for burns

- Skin may continue to burn if not cooled. Immediately douse burns with large amounts of cold water.
- Cover the burn with a sterile dressing, or at least clean material to protect infection;
- Over the counter medications may be used for pain. Adhere to directions given on the label;
- Seek further medical attention, as required.

Prevention of burns

- Check the temperature of your hot water tank. Temperatures as high as 60°C / 140°F will scald a child in just seconds;
- Use placemats instead of tablecloths. Tablecloths can be yanked downward causing hot drinks or food to spill on a child;
- Turn pot handles to the back of the stove and ensure cords from kettles, slow cookers, and other electrical appliances cannot be reached;
- Avoid picking up a child while holding any hot liquids;
- Ensure electrical outlets are made secure by installing commercially available safety devices which prohibit access, if not already built in;
- Keep children away from areas where appliances are in use (kettles, irons, hot stoves).

Keeping Storm Drains Clear This Spring

Storm drains (or catch basins) are the main way stormwater gets into our underground pipes, or rather our stormwater management system. There are about 60,000 storm drains in Calgary which capture water off sidewalks, streets and roads. The City of Calgary has an online map that shows where storm drains are located. Calgary's Pioneer of Public Health


s we mark the end of a second pandemic year, let's salute the evolution of public health that has served our citizens throughout the last century.

It all began with Ontario born Dr. Cecil Stanley Mahood, not yet 30 years old, who opened a medical practice in our burgeoning city in 1911. This Ontario farm boy was educated in Toronto and Chicago, had worked at the Denver public health department, and was superintendent at a London, Ont. sanatorium. The young doctor was soon appointed Calgary's medical health officer. Little did he know the role he would play in pioneering public health here.

Spanish influenza hit Calgary on October 2, 1918, when a contingent of local WW1 soldiers arrived at the Canadian Pacific Railway Station, where the Calgary Tower now stands. Mahood had been warned of their return and was aware that a virulent flu was sweeping North America. He immediately guarantined the soldiers at an isolation hospital, the ruins of which can still be seen on the Stampede Grounds. Other infected travellers soon arrived. Thanksgiving gatherings and armistice celebrations were spreader events. Lacking the proper authority, Mahood faced challenges in enforcing home guarantines, opening more isolation hospitals, closing schools and theatres, and ordering the public to wear masks. Although the provincial government supported his actions, business interests and churches applied pressure to relax some restrictions just as another wave hit in December of 1918. The Spanish flu eventually killed more people worldwide, including Mahood's own wife Ina, than were killed during WW1.

Visit the ghosts of those first quarantined soldiers and

explore the Rundle Ruins at 632 13 Ave SE. The Calgary General Hospital #2 was constructed in the 1890s of locally quarried sandstone. It had five private wards, a signal bell system, electric lights, one telephone, and a nurses' training school. When Calgary General Hospital #3 opened in Bridgeland in 1910, #2 was converted to an isolation hospital. Between 1954 and 1971 the United Church operated it as a seniors' home called Rundle Lodge. It was demolished in 1973, and the remains were dedicated by Premier Peter Lougheed.
