Calgary Transit service updates

Four times a year, Calgary Transit reviews services levels, schedules, and routes. This September, there are several changes affecting Ward 1 including Bowness and service to Bowness High School. Visit calgarytransit.com/ serviceupdates for details.

Housing and Affordability Task Force

Later this month, the Community Development Committee will receive the recommendations of the Housing and Affordability Task Force, including a chance to hear public comments. I still welcome your feedback on the proposed recommendations. You can learn more at calgary.ca/ housing.

Valley Ridge pathway

Unfortunately, early summer storms again washed out the multi-use pathway connecting Valley Ridge to Bowness Park. At the time of writing, the timeline for a repair remains unclear. My office is working with City Administration and the province to get this fixed as quickly as possible. Visit calgary.ca/pathwayclosures for a map of temporary pathway closures around the city.

9 PM routine

The Ward 1 Office and the Calgary Police Service remind Calgarians of the importance of maintaining safe and secure practices for your home and vehicle. Ward 1 residents are encouraged to follow the 9 PM routine by ensuring valuables are removed from vehicles, house and vehicle doors are closed and locked, garage doors are closed and locked, and an outside light is turned on.

Calgarians are encouraged to report all crimes at calgarypolice.ca or by calling 403-266-1234. Your reports help police identify trends and direct resources accordingly.

Traffic safety

Improving pedestrian and traffic safety in Ward 1 continues to be one of my top priorities. There have been several improvements made in Ward 1 over the summer, including in Crestmont and the ongoing pilot in Silver Springs.

Back to School Safety Tips

T he school year should be safe and educational for everyone - kids and parents should be aware of the following safety tips before the start of the semester.

Safety tips for your child

Make sure your child knows:

- Their full name, age, address, area code, home phone number and parents' work/cellphone number.
- How to contact police, fire and EMS in an emergency (9-1-1) and in a non-emergency (403-266-1234).
- To use the same route to and from school.
- Where the safe places are to play (front and backyards, playgrounds).
- What places to avoid (vacant lots, dark, wooded, bushy areas).

If your child is being followed by a person or car, make sure they know to do the following:

- turn and run in the opposite direction;
- get a description and licence number of the stranger's vehicle if possible;
- run to the closest safe place; and,
- stay in open areas that are visible.

Remember to tell them that uniformed police officers are friends who can be trusted.

The stranger rules

Familiarize your child with "the stranger rules" - these rules will help keep them safe.

- Never talk to strangers.
- Never take anything from strangers.
- Never go anywhere with a stranger.
- Do not be fooled by tricks or phoney conversation.
- If a stranger tries to grab you, yell, scream and kick.
- Never tell a stranger you are by yourself or that your parents or guardian are not home.
- It's a good idea to implement a difficult to guess, but easy to remember "code word" that an adult must share with your child before your child trusts/goes anywhere with them (e.g., the colour of their shirt, what they had for breakfast that morning, etc.).

In Our City

North American Beavers

 \mathbf{T} he ponds and lakes that make picturesque sunset photos across the Canadian Shield are largely due to the industrious *Castor canadensis*, or North American Beaver. This rodent, the largest in North America, is often described as an ecosystem engineer, modifying its environment to create dams and raise water levels to evade predators.

Beavers are not agile land animals but are welladapted to living in water. They have flaps that close over their nose and ears as well as a third eyelid (the nictitating membrane) for swimming. Their tail serves as a rudder, and the webbing between their toes helps them navigate underwater for up to fifteen minutes.

Beavers' historical importance has landed them a spot on our nickel, but they are also important to solving problems in our future! Once a concern in causing floods, the beaver is now combating floods. Beaver habitat is full of canals, twisting waterways, healthy aquifers, and vegetation ready to act like a sponge to slow the flow of heavy rainfall or snow melt. Conversely, this habitat also shows resilience in the face of drought and is an important fire-breaker and refuge for wildlife during fire season. Wetlands also help restore water purity, filtering out pollution by letting heavy metals and other pollutants settle in the slower-moving ponds and streams. Wetland habitat



American beavers dam to raise the water for protection from predators. This creates wetland habitat for species like the tiger salamander and moose. Beaver habitat has increased resistance to flooding, fire, and drought!



also increases biodiversity building homes for so many other creatures!

Beavers don't hibernate but set aside leafed branches of willow and poplar in an "underwater fridge" near their lodge which they forage from during the winter months.

Beavers are family-oriented animals, living with their parents for their first two years. Kits are born in the spring. Kits are nursed for the first six weeks. Parents will often carry kits in their paws or on their tails.

Coexistence with beavers is happening! Flooding caused by beaver dams can now be regulated using pond levelers or flow devices. These devices allow beavers to keep a safe depth of water without causing overland flooding that might affect homes in the area. Trees can be preserved by wrapping their lower trunks in metal wire cages, with some un-caged trees left for beavers!

Calgary's Bar, Pub and Restaurant Heritage

In virtually every Western movie, there's the inevitable confrontation in the town saloon. As a western prairie town, there's little doubt Calgary was home to a saloon when its first neighbourhood, Inglewood, was settled in 1875. Indeed, the area was first known as Brewery Flats.

The 1890 Italianate-style Alberta Hotel building boasted the longest bar between Winnipeg and Vancouver. But it's the King (Eddy) Edward that lasted, opening in 1905 until it closed 99 years later as Calgary's longest operating bar. In 2018, it resumed its storied place in the city's nightlife as part of the National Music Centre.

There's the Palliser Hotel, which opened in 1914 and entertained Calgarians in its Oak Room (now remodelled). After prohibition ended in Alberta in 1924, the Palliser was the first to receive a liquor licence. Also opened in 1914 was the (in)famous St. Louis Hotel.

Another city establishment is Hy's Steakhouse, Calgary's oldest restaurant. Hy Aisenstate, the son of Russian Jewish immigrants, opened it in 1955. He had started law school at UBC but was forced into entrepreneurship due to a family crisis. The current iteration opened in 2014.

Let's not forget Caesar's Steak House, part of local folklore. It opened in 1972 because Greek immigrant Con Giannoulis wanted to own a restaurant and the building housing it. It's said the Caesar cocktail was popularized here, though it was perfected and named in 1969 at the Calgary Inn (now the Westin) by Italian bartender Walter Chell. Nevertheless, who doesn't want a Caesar at Caesar's?

Then there's more recent but no less important places, like Bottlescrew Bill's Pub, opened in 1985 by the Allan family in the old Calgary Press Club site, and Kensington

Pub (K-Pub), established in 1982 in a residence from 1911.

Nowadays, several establishments occupy the buildings and residences of the city's past. There's Bank & Baron,

located in the Bank of Nova Scotia building built in 1930, and Civic Tavern, operating in a 1905 Queen Anne Revivalstyle home. Next time you're heading out on the town, keep an eye out for some of Calgary's heritage.
